We believe in the triune God, Creator, Redeemer, and Sustainer, who gathers, protects and cares for the church through Word and Spirit.

This God has done since the beginning of the world and will do to the end.

We believe in one holy, universal Christian church, the communion of saints called from the entire human family.

We believe that Christ's work of reconciliation is made manifest in the church as the community of believers who have been reconciled with God and with one another.

We believe that unity is, therefore, both a gift and an obligation for the church of Jesus Christ.

We believe that through the working of God's Spirit it is a binding force, yet simultaneously a reality which must be earnestly pursued and sought.

We believe that, in obedience to Jesus Christ, its only head, the church is called to confess and to do all these things,

even though the authorities and human laws might forbid them and punishment and suffering be the consequence.

We believe that Jesus is Lord. To the one and only God, Creator, Christ, and Holy Spirit be the honor and the glory for ever and ever.

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About our Baccalaureate Preacher



Dr. Janice McLean-Farrell

Dr. Janice McLean-Farrell is the Dirk Romeyn Assistant Professor of Metro-Urban Ministry and Assistant Dean of Doctoral Studies at New Brunswick Theological Seminary (NBTS). She teaches in the areas of urban ministry, migration, research methods, and community leadership. She conducts research in the areas of religions of the African Diaspora, Christianity in the Caribbean, migration, parenting within immigrant families, urban immigrant youth and religion, immigrant churches in the Diaspora, and women and migration. In the classroom, Dr. McLean-Farrell's teaching philosophy is intentionally post-colonial and liberative.

Her pedagogy affirms multiple ways of learning, the significance of experiential learning, and making one's learning applicable to one's context. Dr. McLean-Farrell is the author of West Indian Pentecostals: Living their Faith in New York and London (Bloomsbury, 2016) and numerous articles including "Mission in Contested Places/Spaces: The SPG, Slavery, and Codrington College, Barbados" (2021) and "Nurturing the Disruptive Voice: Reflections on Naaman's Slave Girl (2 Kings 5) and Cultivating the Voices of African American and Black Immigrant Girls" (With Dr. Terry Smith - forthcoming). She is the co-editor of Understanding World Christianity: The Vision and Work of Andrew F. Walls (Orbis, 2011) and Engaging the World: Christian Communities in Contemporary Global Societies (Regnum, 2014). Dr. McLean-Farrell serves on various committees at NBTS and on the steering committee of the Alliance for Black Pentecostal scholarship. She also co-chairs the World Christianity unit of the American Academy of Religion and is a member of the Vital Worship Grant Advisory Board for the Calvin Institute of Christian Worship at Calvin University. Dr. McLean-Farrell is passionate about equipping leaders for ministry in urban spaces. For several years, she served as a commissioned pastor at New Song Community Church in Harlem, NY. She was also the co-chair of the board of trustees for New Song Community Cooperation. Dr. McLean-Farrell is a consultant for various immigrant churches in New York City. She and her family are members of Madison Avenue Christian Reformed Church in Paterson, New Jersey. She and her husband live in New York City, and they are the parents of two children. In her spare time, Dr. McLean-Farrell likes to garden, grow vegetables in grow bags on her deck, cook, take nature pictures, and watch Korean dramas.
