About Our Commencement Speaker

Reverend Peter M. Wherry, PhD



Rev. Dr. Peter M. Wherry is a 45-year veteran pastor, community leader, social activist and scholar. Since January of 2007, he has been Senior Pastor of the Mayfield Memorial Missionary Baptist Church in Charlotte, NC. Through his work as Founding Moderator of the United Missionary Baptist Association, Dr. Wherry provided leadership to 70 mostly Baptist churches in Charlotte and its surrounding counties, having a constituency of over 40,000 persons. He is one of the pioneer foot soldiers of the Forward Together Moral Movement, under the leadership of Rev. Dr. William Barber, having been among the first two groups of people who submitted themselves for arrest while petitioning the North Carolina General Assembly for economic and social justice, including the fight against voter suppression. He has served as guest lecturer and featured preacher at several seminaries including Gordon Conwell in Charlotte, NC; Union Presbyterian Seminary

in Charlotte, NC; Regent University in Virginia Beach, VA; the Samuel DeWitt Proctor School of Theology at Virginia Union University in Richmond, VA, where he also served as an adjunct faculty member, teaching Baptist History; and the Hood Theological Seminary in Salisbury, NC, where he has served as a doctoral advisor. In 2014, Dr. Wherry was a Main Stage preacher for the centennial session of the Hampton University Ministers Conference, the largest gathering of African American clergy in the world. Dr. Wherry has preached from coast-to-coast in the U.S. and internationally in Greece, Haiti, El Salvador, South Africa, Burundi, and Zambia.

Dr. Wherry is the author of a number of books, articles, and scholarly papers. With his wife, Dr. Wanda H. Wherry, he co-wrote a unique devotional book, A Door of Hope: A Devotional with Sermons and Songs of Hope. This first-of-its-kind book included a CD of music, produced by Dr. Wherry and sung by his wife. He collaborated with Dr. Rodney S. Sadler, Jr. (Union Presbyterian Seminary, Charlotte) and Dr. William Turner (Duke University) in writing The Forward Together Lectionary for the NC NAACP. It is a unique resource to assist preachers in the task of incorporating Social Justice into their pulpit ministries of houses of faith. His latest book is entitled Preaching Funerals in the Black Church: Bringing Perspective to Pain, available through Judson Press, Amazon, Amazon UK, and other online outlets. The Wherrys have been happily married for 42 years. They are the grateful parents of two adult children, Justin (Amy) and Bethany, and the excited grandparents of three (Amari, Amaya, and Michael).

NEW BRUNSWICK Theological Seminary

We are a multiethnic, intergenerational, ecumenical theological institution of higher education that instills creative, contextual, and critical thinking and a passion for justice that reflects God's transforming love in Jesus Christ.

Our History

New Brunswick Seminary began in 1784, when the Synod of the Reformed Protestant Dutch Church—now known as the Reformed Church in America—elected a New York pastor named John Henry Livingston (1746–1825) to be its "professor." His task was to prepare students to become the Reformed Church's ministers of the Word.

Livingston fulfilled that task first in New York City and then, from 1810 until his death, in New Brunswick, where—at first sharing a building and other resources with Queen's College (now Rutgers University)—what began as only a small group consisting of this theological professor and his students, quickly acquired the structures of organization and support that made it a resilient institution. And here in New Brunswick, surrounded by the College Avenue campus of Rutgers (though from 1867 no longer officially connected with it), the seminary has thrived for more than two centuries.

Over that time, some things have not changed. The seminary's task is still to prepare ministers for their calling. It still has ties to the Reformed Church in America, and it remains centered in the doctrines of the grace and sovereignty of God that are dear to the Reformed tradition.

But in many other respects, the seminary has changed, especially over the last half-century, as the range of communities it serves has broadened and its vision of ministry has widened. Beginning in the 1960s, major adjustments in the curriculum brought a new emphasis on urban ministry. Then, in the 1970s, NBTS made a commitment to offer evening classes and to welcome part-time students, female students, and students of color. Thus began an evolution which has continued ever since—seen more recently in our move to online and hybrid learning which expands our reach and serves our students in ways that meet their needs. All these developments reflect a vision and identity which we still embrace today: to be a multiethnic, intergenerational, ecumenical theological institution of higher education that instills creative, contextual, and critical thinking and a passion for justice that reflects God's transforming love in Jesus Christ.

Purpose

Called in Jesus Christ, empowered by the Holy Spirit, New Brunswick Theological Seminary participates in God's own laboring to fulfill God's reign on earth.

Rooted in the Reformed tradition and centered in its trust of God's sovereignty and grace, the Seminary is an inter-cultural, ecumenical school of Christian faith, learning, and scholarship committed to its metro-urban and global contexts.

Our purpose is to educate persons and strengthen communities for transformational, public ministries in church and society. We fulfill this through creative, contextual, and critical engagement with texts, traditions, and practices.
